The Park Commission is a member of the Regional Center Partnership, which is also comprised of the Somerset County Planning Board; the townships of Bridgewater, Somerville, Raritan and Manville; and the Somerset County Business Partnership. The Regional Center Partnership is partnering with the New Jersey Water Supply Authority to offer homeowners rain barrel rebates of up to \$200 for residents of Somerville, Bridgewater, Raritan and Manville. A Rain Barrel collects and stores rainwater from a roof. It prevents the rainwater from becoming stormwater runoff that picks up pollutants and carries them into storm drains, streets, or streams. Rain Barrels allow you to store and conserve water, while at the same time, help to keep our rivers and reservoirs clean.

Because there are so many rooftops, driveways, and roads in Somerville, Bridgewater, Raritan and Manville this area is a concern for water quality. Rain Barrels can make a difference in reducing pollution and easing stream erosion caused by heavy stormwater.

2021 RAIN BARREL REBATES AVAILABLE Regional Center Rain Barrel Rebates for Bridgewater, Raritan & Somerville Homeowners

SOMERVILLE, NJ – The Somerset County Regional Center Partnership, utilizing a grant from the New Jersey Water Supply Authority (NJWSA), has announced that the 2021 Raritan River Rain Barrel Rebate Program for homeowners in Bridgewater, Raritan, Somerville and Manville is accepting applications for the program.

Rebates are available in the amount up to \$200.

All require proof of purchase and installation.

Rain barrels provide homeowners with financial and ecological advantages by conserving water, easing stream erosion by reducing the volume of runoff entering to streams and rivers during storms, and reducing pollutants accumulated from impervious surfaces, particularly roofs. In established urban areas like the Regional Center, rainwater runoff from hard surfaces flows directly into streams, depositing these pollutants.

Rain barrels must have a closed design or screen top; have a system to direct excess water away from the home's foundation; have a spigot not higher that 3" from the bottom of the barrel; and must be made of a sturdy material and installed on a solid level base. Homeowners must pledge to maintain the rain barrel for at least two years to be eligible for the rebate.

"A rain barrel is a simple and effective way of practicing environmental responsibility," commented Troy Fischer, Chair of the Somerset County Regional Center Partnership. "Homeowners in the Regional Center communities have a unique opportunity to recoup their investment twice, once through the rebate and multiple times through re-use of rain water." Rebates will be awarded on a first come, first served basis, and funding is limited. BACKGROUNDER

The Somerset County Regional Center is the strategic center of the County consisting of 12.6 square miles encompassing Raritan Borough, Somerville Borough, and a portion of Bridgewater Township. The Center is bisected by U.S. Route 206, U.S. Route 202, U.S. Route 22, NJ State Route 28, and I-287 with public transit options and serves as the focal point of County government and the regional economy.

- makes available priority support for open space concepts by planning and designing new and existing active
 recreation facilities, for passive open space acquisitions, and for new and existing historic preservation and
 revitalization programs.
